"Back to the Roots"

Learn more about this topic! Each section gives more detail on one of the lyrics from the song. Read each section, and then respond by answering the question or taking notes on key ideas.

Lyric: roots



Only about a third of English words are English by origin. More than half our words in English come from Latin, and another 5% come from Greek. These words are formed by taking a **root** and

adding combinations of prefixes and suffixes. And it's the root that makes up the main meaning of a word. Some roots are standalone words; they're a word all by themselves. Others need a prefix or suffix to complete the meaning. **Aqua** is an example of a standalone root word.

To see how roots work, let's take a look at the word **aquarium**. The root is **aqua** which means "water" and the suffix **-rium** means "place" or "building." So an **aquarium** is a place or building that holds water. If you've seen a fish tank, you've seen one kind of **aquarium**.

Lyric: D-I-C-T



The root DICT (from Latin) means "speak" or "say."

Dictation is when one person speaks while the other person writes down what is said.

A dictionary is a book listing

alphabetically the words of one language and showing their meanings.

If the prefix **contra-** means "against" or "opposite," what do you think the word **contradict** means?

Lyric: Aut





The root AUT (from Greek) means "self."

If you're writing a book about yourself, you're writing an **autobiography**. If this book becomes a bestseller, you might be asked for your **autograph**.

Notice the word **autograph** has two roots: **aut** and **graph**. Which one is a stand alone root word? Now can you guess what **graph** means?

Lyric: Ped and pod





The roots PED and POD (from Greek) mean "foot."

Pedaling for hours on your bike might make your feet hurt.
A **podiatrist** is a doctor who'll make your feet feel better.

Have you ever walked across a pedestrian bridge?

Lyric: Port





The root word PORT (from Latin) means "carry."

Almost everyone these days has a **portable** phone.

Transportation can take the form of planes, trains, or automobiles.

You've probably seen an airport, but can you guess what a teleport is?

Lyric: Tele





The root TELE (from Greek) means "far."

Use a **telescope** if you want to look at the moon or stars.

Use a **telephone** If you want to talk to a relative who lives in another state (or even next door).

What does someone do if they telecommute?

Lyric: Spec



The root word SPEC (from Latin) means "look."

The officials **inspected** the field before the game began.

Spectators are the people sitting in the

stands at the game.

Do you know what **spectacles** are?

Lyric: form



The root word FORM (from Latin) means "shape."

Notice that **form** is another standalone word.

What is the **formula** for success? In order to be accepted by others, some

people conform.

If the prefix non- means "not" and the suffix -ist means "someone who does something," then what is a **nonconformist**?

Lyric: tempo




The root word TEMPO (from Latin) means "time."

As a standalone root word, **tempo** refers specifically to the speed of music. As a root word in a larger word it refers to things having to do with time.

The **tempo** changed from fast to slow in the middle of the song. A **temporary** solution is something for the time being; it doesn't last.

How fast do you think you'd have to play a piece of music that is **uptempo**?

Lyric: Graph



The root word GRAPH (from Greek) means "write" or "draw."

When you take a **photograph**, you're "writing down" or recording an image.
A piece of writing might be accompanied by an illustration or a **graphic**.

If your math teacher asks you to **graph a problem**, what is she asking you to do?

Lyric: Photo



The root word PHOTO (from Greek) means "relating to light."

Photosynthesis is a process by which plants convert sunlight into energy. Teachers **photocopy** tests and worksheets.

Can you guess what a **telephoto** lens does?

Lyric: Mit or Miss



The roots MIT or MISS (from Latin) means "send."

A **missive** is a form of written communication, usually a letter. You need a **permit** in order to leave the classroom.

What does it mean to transmit a message?

Lyric: Meter



The root word METER (from Greek) means "measure."

If you want to measure how hot or cold something is, just use a **thermometer**. If you want to measure how far your car has traveled, check the **odometer**.

The prefix nano- means "extremely small." So what do you think nanometers are used for?

Lyric: aster



The root ASTER or ASTR (from Greek) means "stars."

If you want to study stars, planets and asteroids, then you might become an astronomer.

Why do you think they call this

Lyric: phono





Megaphones are used by cheerleaders, police officers or someone speaking to a large crowd.

Long before the days of MP3s and CDs, people listened to music on

phonographs.

If the prefix caco- means "bad," what do you think a **cacophonous** piece of music would sound like?

Lyric: fin

The root FIN (from Latin) means "end."

So we've come to the end of this song, the **finale**.
